Invasive species have no place in our landscape. The ability and responsibility to manage feral animals rests with every land manager.

About Feral Fighters

 Strategically targets feral animals at a regional and state scale through well timed coordinated group baiting and control programs.

Why become a Feral Fighter?

- Make commitment to your neighbours, community, local industries and the environment.
- Group control programs have proven to reduce feral pests over broad areas with more sustainable outcomes.

What are the benefits?

- Better results across a bigger area.
- Assist endangered species of native animals, such as ground dwelling birds, small reptiles and mammals to recover from fox predation.

What support will I receive?

Registering to become a Feral Fighter and receive:

- · free pesticide training
- the first 30 meat baits free for Feral Fighters
- an aerial map of your property for planning purposes
- up-to-date information and support from Local Land Services.

Why should I spring bait?

- Dramatically reduce the number of foxes around next autumn.
- Foxes breed once a year, mating in late winter with a gestation time of approx. 53 days. Breeding females wean about four cubs; larger litters are possible.
- Baiting is crucial for all lamb producers to reduce the fox population.









 Reduce the number of young foxes in autumn dispersing to find new territories. They can move up to 30km away from their dens.



What is the role of Local Land Services?

Local Land Services will:

- Coordinate training, bait collection, and other essential services to support the Feral Fighters program
- Promote Feral Fighters in the media
- Bait Travelling Stock Reserves.
