Welcome to the September Edition of the Advocate

There have been some changes at Landcare NSW of late with the arrival and departure of several staff members.

Landcare NSW is pleased to advise that again it will be receiving support under the NLP State level network program. This funding is crucial to ensure that LNSW can operate as a representational organisation, underpins the core requirements for LNSW to be an effective participant in the national Landcare Networks efforts to provide information to and from the Australian Government and programs.

Landcare NSW has also recently learnt that it was successful under the NSW Environmental Trusts Lead Environment Community Group funding. This will provide \$144,000 over the next two years to support the representation, communication and linkages of Landcare in NSW at the state level, and will allow for Landcare NSW to support a regional scale event for each region in NSW over the upcoming 2 years, plus support the state-wide LNSW Muster to be held in September 2017.

Landcare NSW will work with Regional representatives from the Council of LNSW to identify suitable regional scale events, at which skills training and partnership development sessions will be held.

The LECG 15-16 Workshop Series: Share Learn Connect – Biodiversity

Landcare NSW, through the support of the NSW Environmental Trust (LECG15-16), delivered a series of eight workshops across NSW during the submission phase of the NSW Biodiversity Reforms, which had a focus on connecting, sharing and learning. In addition, the Office of Environment and Heritage hosted a webinar for Landcarers to discuss and ask questions about the proposed reforms.

The comments from Landcarers have been collated into a document. Landcare NSW throughout the process remained impartial — no specific position was adopted by Landcare NSW, rather LNSW undertook to ensure the many views of Landcarers were represented. Landcarers across NSW —

groups and individuals – were also encouraged to make submissions to ensure a full range of views were represented.

The project is not quite finalised, with a few regions still holding workshops or other activities.

NOTICE OF Annual General Meeting Ensure your region has an Endorsed Representative

Landcare NSW advises its members that the AGM of Landcare NSW Inc will be held on 8th November 2016, at the VFFF board room 99 Macquarie St Sydney commencing at 3.30pm.

Regions are reminded to please ensure that if Landcare NSW has not yet received a nomination form for the 2016/17 membership year, that a nomination form for the endorsed regional representative is received prior to 8th October 2016.

Sustaining Landcare: The Landcare Trust Project

As part of the Local Landcare Coordinator Initiative (funded from 2015 -2019), the NSW Government has tasked Landcare NSW to identify options to diversify its revenue base in order to fund the local coordinators and Landcare support services when the current program finishes in June 2019. The purpose of the Landcare Trust Project is to fund Landcare support services, not on-ground projects.

The target is to replace the annual \$3.5 million funding to continue the Landcare support program from July 2019, while ensuring the necessary infrastructure is also developed for Landcare NSW to support this initiative.

Memberships -Seeking Your Input

A membership sub-committee has been formed and are finalising a discussion paper to be circulated to the broader Landcare community. This draft was discussed at the LNSW Council meeting and it was resolved that Councillors would consult with communities in regard to the membership proposals.

In particular Councillors will be looking for your input on the following items :

- 1. Defining regions: Landcarers will be consulted on what they believe to be the social catchments or regions of Landcare in NSW.
- 2. Membership Categories, benefits of membership and proposed membership fees.

Based on the feedback the Membership Committee will progress this matter and seek advice and undertake actions required to amend the constitution of LNSW to accommodate the proposal. Stage 1 of the Landcare Trust Project has valued the guidance of a project Steering Committee comprising Landcare NSW Executive. senior government, and commercial experience. Along with input from the Landcare community, Landcare NSW Council, Landcare NSW Executive and LLS/LNSW Joint Management Committee, the project has developed the draft Funding Model for consideration.

The Proposed Model

The consultation process with the Landcare community showed support for development of new funding sources in addition to ongoing involvement of Government.

The funding model was presented at the LNSW Council meeting and The endorsed. model proposes Landcare NSW focus on generating new sources independent of government, working to become selfreliant by 2019. Once this goal is achieved, model the suggests government funding be contributed on a dollar-for-dollar matching, to support the growth and development to enhance the network of volunteer support.

To generate a minimum of \$3.75m per year (needed to cover the current investment Local Landcare Coordinators and their operation) organisational requires significant growth for Landcare NSW. Significant new revenue streams will be required, most particularly the introduction of a wide range of new membership packages. Landcare NSW will also be looking to philanthropic contributions and will seek partner with to government to support long-term growth.

Insurance

One of the major concerns of many groups is insurance — common questions raised with Landcare NSW are: what types are needed?; what does it cost?; and are we adequately covered?

Landcare NSW has been working on the insurance issue over the past 3 years - an information booklet is available at http://landcarensw.org.au/member-resources/insurance/

Landcare NSW has undertaken extensive research into the benefits and problems with group insurance schemes, and as part of the discussions re membership benefits and packages LNSW is now utilising that research to obtain a preferred insurance product for Landcare groups in NSW. Watch this space as this exciting initiative unfolds.

Environmental Restoration and Rehabilitation Grants

The NSW Environmental Trust's Restoration & Rehabilitation Grants are now open for applications.

The program offers \$4 million worth of grant funding under two streams:

- Projects by community organisation, and;
- Projects by government entities

Aim of the program

The aim of the Restoration and Rehabilitation Program is to facilitate projects run by community organisations and government entities working to prevent or reduce environmental degradation of any kind.

Applications are open for grants between \$5,000 – \$100,000. Closing date is Monday 26 September 2016 at 3pm. For more information check out the NSW Environmental Trust's website.

Update on the Local Landcare Coordinator Initiative

It's now 5 months since the initial induction training workshop and there is activity aplenty amongst the host organisations and at the Landcare NSW and Local Land Services level.

All regions are supporting their coordinators and host committees through the Regional scale Community of Practice - activities have included teleconferences, staff meetings, whole of region get togethers, and focussed training events.

To support this Regional Community of Practice the program has provided each Regional Landcare Facilitator (RLF) with a small training budget to each region (\$15,000 over three years). The training should be determined by the region in conjunction with the RLF, and should focus on building the skills of coordinators and the committees of host organisations to support the delivery of the Local Landcare Coordinator Initiative program.
