Want to get involved and **report conditions on your farm**? The NSW DPI Farm Tracker app allows you to take stock of conditions at your place. The app allows you to record rainfall, pasture availability, livestock conditions, crop performance and other on farm conditions. This allows you to keep a record of your farm over time, or use the information to compare different areas of your farm. If updated regularly this can help provide a valuable record of how seasonal conditions affect your property. The information you collect will also contribute to the Government's seasonal conditions monitoring. The data from your reports provides a valuable ground truth of the information in NSW DPI's seasonal conditions monitoring systems. Over time your data will also help improve the accuracy of early warning for all farmers across NSW. This is particularly valuable in areas where there are few rain gauges.

Farm decision making and climate change: Opportunity to participate Decisions land managers make are based on research, training and often 'rules of thumb'.

These rules of thumb can guide decisions such as when to join, what pastures perform better, what paddocks you use for off shears etc.

Variations we are beginning to experience as part of climate change may have an influence on these accepted rules of thumb. Researchers from the Australian National University and University of Technology Sydney have a current research project exploring agricultural adaptations to climate change and are looking for land managers to help them!

If you choose to participate in this study, researchers will ask you to:

Complete discussions, either in person or over the phone (up to 3 in the year)

Attend one or two (1 day) workshops over the year

Researchers would schedule activities around your availability.

Through combining the expertise of the farmers involved in the study with the research from ANU and UTS, the researchers will develop rules-of-thumb which are useful and appropriate to climate change adaptation decision-making. 17 August to 2 September for 'NSW Sustaining Landcare Week', supported by the NSW Parliamentary Friends of Landcare (PFL). Sustaining Landcare is about securing the services and support Landcare groups need to carry out their valuable projects and activities. We need to raise awareness of the consequences if Landcare does not have access to core infrastructure such as Local Coordinators and central support services. Landcare NSW has advised the NSW Government and all political parties that the cost of Landcare support over four years is \$32.5 million. Because of your hard work, Members of Parliament (MPs) are beginning to understand the issues. But there's more work to do, hence we hope you will read this email and take action.

Our State Minister, the Hon Niall Blair, has received a copy of the Progress Report on the NSW Local
Landcare Coordinator Initiative. We encourage all Landcarers to read this report and share it among your networks. It highlights the positive difference Landcare is making with the support of the NSW Government and Local Land Services. Educating our elected representatives about Landcare is an ongoing challenge and a great opportunity. For this reason, Landcare NSW is coordinating a statewide event to reach out to MPs and raise awareness of Landcare. While national 'Landcare Week' would seem the obvious opportunity, this is held in September when the NSW Parliament is in session making it impossible for MPs to attend events in their electorates.

Our aim is to encourage Landcare regions to hold an event to showcase your group and activities to your local Member of Parliament and other candidates in your electorate. This will assist groups to form a relationship with their local MP and other key stakeholders, including Local Land Services. If you already have this relationship, inviting them to an event will help to keep it alive. By holding activities statewide over the course of a week or 10 days we aim to increase our impact and raise awareness of Landcare.

This event may be something you already have planned: a tree planting, a field day, a working bee, a guided walk, an education session...the key is to make sure you invite your local MP! Please invite your Federal MP,











too, as we also want to build relationships with representatives in Canberra. The PFL will send a notice to all NSW Members of Parliament encouraging them to accept the invitation to attend a local Landcare event in their electorate and will also encourage them to get in touch with the Local Landcare Coordinator in their region to find out about upcoming events. The PFL Chair Kevin Anderson, Member for Tamworth, has committed to organising a debate (a Notice of Motion) in the Legislative Assembly of the NSW Parliament the week beginning 17 September which will enable all MPs to speak about Landcare in their electorate and the events they attended. In order to ensure the likelihood of your MP being able to attend your event, can you please send out an invitation to the MPs' offices ASAP and at the latest by mid-June.

DROUGHT-AFFECTED FARMERS

Support for farmers and their families facing drought has been boosted by \$284 million in the NSW Budget 2018, bringing the NSW Government's drought relief package to well over half a billion dollars. For more information please see the attached press release or go to https://www.dpi.nsw.gov.au/climate-and-emergencies/droughthub.

"To date, the Farm Innovation Fund has delivered \$220 million to more than 1300 farmers to help build on-farm infrastructure, and prepare for and battle drought. "Our farmers are continuing to tell us that these loans are one of the best measures available, which is why we have decided to double the funding available, taking the Fund's total value to \$500 million." The NSW Government will also expand the criteria of the Fund to deliver \$50,000 seven-year interest free loans to allow producers to bring in fodder and grain to sustain stock on hand, as well as install key water infrastructure. The NSW Government's drought package includes: An additional \$250 million in the Farm Innovation Fund, which:

o provides farmers with low-interest loans of up to \$250,000 to improve farm infrastructure and help farmers prepare for and deal with drought;

o introduces new loans of up to \$50,000 that will be interest-free for seven years, to allow producers to bring in fodder and grain, to move livestock, or install key water infrastructure including troughs, underground pipes or water-saving technology;

New criteria in the Farm Innovation Fund which allows farmers to use the loans to "bio-bank" the genetics of their herd that would otherwise be lost during destocking; Additional staff within the Department of Primary Industries to process and streamline Farm Innovation Fund applications; More than \$4 million in mental health support for communities facing natural disaster and drought including:











o Support for the Centre for Rural and Remote Mental Health, including continued funding for 13 statewide coordinators to link rural people to the help they need; and

o Additional counselling support through funding for the National Association for Loss and Grief, a Dubbobased NGO.

New funding of \$25 million to build and operate three new Doppler radar weather stations in the Central West and Far West to improve weather forecasting and help farmers make better business decisions;

A new kangaroo management plan to reduce kangaroo numbers in drought-hit areas, including:

- o Removing the need for landholders to physically tag culled kangaroos;
- o Removing the 'shoot and let lie' conditions to reduce bio-security risk;
- o Expanding the commercial harvest zone for kangaroos in the South East of NSW; and
- o Connecting landholders experiencing high kangaroo numbers with commercial harvesters through Local Land Services and other agencies.

Up to \$5 million towards helping local councils repair dirt roads damaged by the temporary access for heavy vehicles carrying feed, water and livestock.

Landcare Receives Funding Boost for Dung Beetles Riverina Highlands Landcare Network is embarking on a 2 year project to look at the opportunities for maximising the use of dung beetles to improve pasture condition. With funding secured from Meat and Livestock Australia, the project will conduct a series of field trials to measure changes in cattle dung pads as a result of dung beetle activity. As part of the field trials, up to five species of beetles will be released across 5 participating properties. The producers involved will be helping with monitoring species survival rates and their spread across the property as well as their effectiveness in











processing the dung. RHLN is looking for 5 properties geographically spread across the region to be involved in this trial.
